We responded to the earthquakes in Türkiye by building small homes for mid-term shelter. We provided shipments of urgently needed medications for communities impacted by the floods in Morocco and Libya.

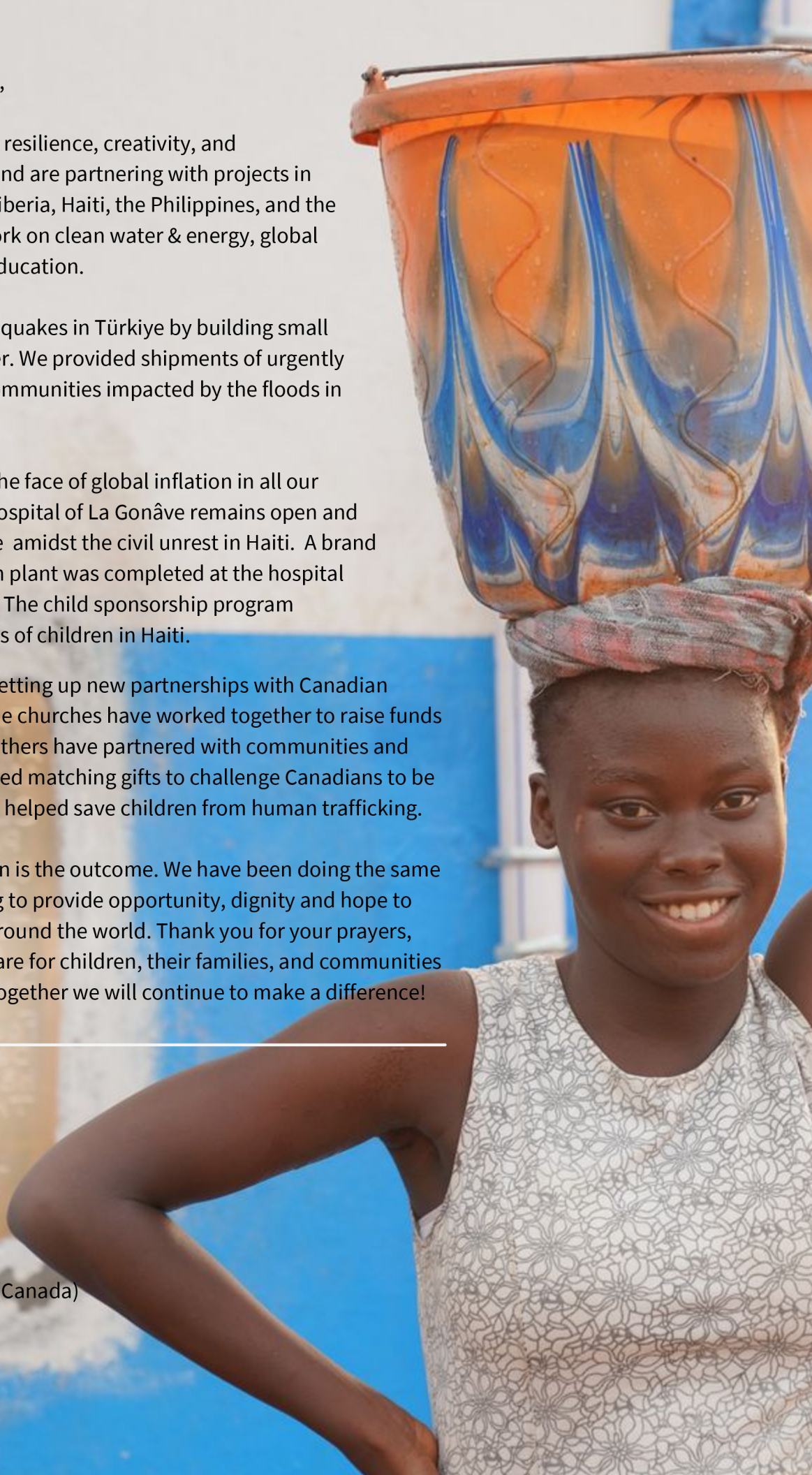
We have been resilient in the face of global inflation in all our locations. The Wesleyen Hospital of La Gonâve remains open and serves the most vulnerable amidst the civil unrest in Haiti. A brand new solar powered Oxygen plant was completed at the hospital bringing hope to patients. The child sponsorship program continues to help hundreds of children in Haiti.

We have been creative in setting up new partnerships with Canadian donors and churches. Some churches have worked together to raise funds for a deep borehole well, others have partnered with communities and schools, some have provided matching gifts to challenge Canadians to be generous, and others have helped save children from human trafficking.

CERVICAL CANCER SCREENING

Saving the lives of women and children

God is a God of healing. Broken relationships, hearts and minds, and bodies. At World Hope we work to see sustainable transformation happen in the way of Jesus. We work alongside communities to ensure inclusive access to health and nutrition services for all—especially the vulnerable.

Of all cancers, cervical cancer highlights the great inequality between developed and developing countries.

A woman from Freetown attended our cervical screening services in April 2023 for the second time. The first time was in July 2022 when she tested VIA positive and was treated on the same day. She had learned about our services through Facebook messages posted by our Community Mobilizer. The second time she came for screening, the lesions had disappeared. In her excitement, she expressed that she was healed because she responded on time.

“I learned that World Hope is providing free screening services to women. Screening discovered that I was positive for cervical cancer. I was treated that same day. After six months, when I was screened again, the lesions had disappeared!”

In many cases in Sierra Leone, when a mom dies, her young children die too, because there is no one to provide for and take care of them. Cervical cancer screening and treatment is saving the lives of women and their children.

CREATIVE SOLUTIONS PROVIDING CLEAN WATER

Increasing access to safe water in West African communities

For one community in Sierra Leone access to **unsafe water**, was about a half hour trek down then back up a steep and treacherous embankment that made it dangerous for children and impossible for the elderly.

Engineers without Borders Denmark in partnership with World Hope International, constructed a spring box catchment system that collects water at the source where it is tested and treated. After treatment and monitoring to know the water is safe for human consumption, it is pumped up the embankment into a storage tank which then flows by gravity to the taps in the community. One hundred and fifty people now have access to safe water without risking injury or taking all day to collect enough unsafe water for their needs.

"Before when we asked the children to fetch water, they cried. The elderly couldn't get water for themselves. It was impossible. But this project has helped us with safe water. We thank God that we no longer have to go down that dangerous embankment to fetch unsafe water."

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS OFFER HOPE

Equipping children to have healthy futures

Education happens in classrooms, but it can also happen in other places and spaces. From dance classes to computer skills and online safety, to personal hygiene, children in Cambodia are learning important skills that will prepare them for the future.

After school programs build confidence in Bunong children who are learning about their cultural heritage through traditional dance. Through sports children develop conflict resolution and healthy communication skills.

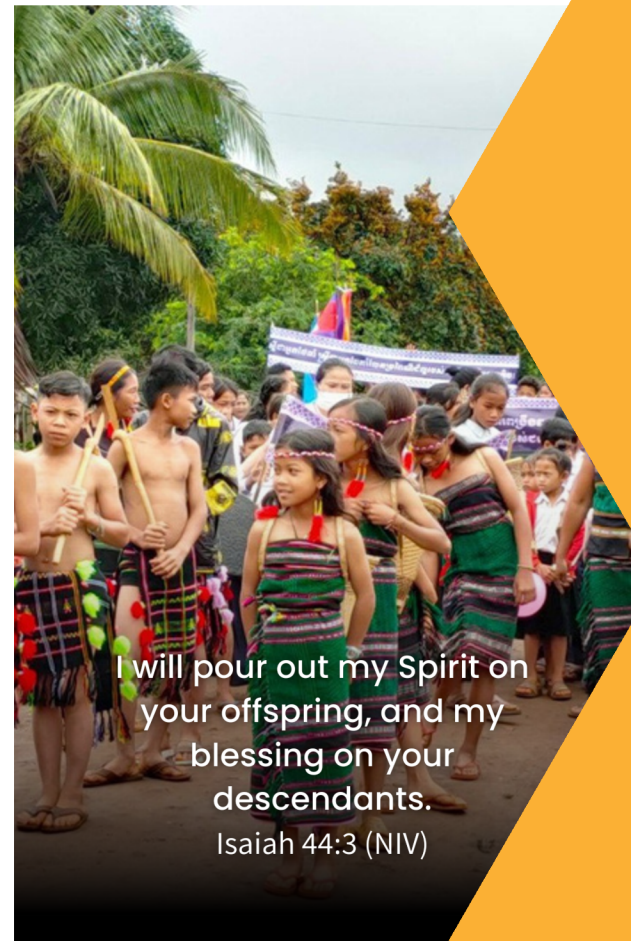
In addition to basic computer skills, participants are learning to protect themselves online. Woven through these after-school programs are lessons about changing unhealthy gender roles, creating a more equitable future for boys and girls, men and women.

Developing healthy hygiene practices and learning English, which will help them in an ever-changing world, are other key aspects of the after-school programs. Every day presents an opportunity to learn something new.

Participating in these programs give Bunong children the understanding and confidence to speak up when they see or experience abuse among themselves or those in their villages. Empowering children will help them experience freedom and hope for their future.

In response, World Hope International, alongside partners on the ground, worked to build mid-term shelters for those affected. These shelters helped to restore a sense of stability and served as a vital step towards long-term recovery.

The Kamara family lost their home in the quake. They were initially sheltered in makeshift tents, enduring harsh weather conditions and inadequate protection. Thanks to your generosity, the Kamara family now resides in a newly built, mid-term home. This new shelter not only offers physical protection but also restores their dignity and hope for the future.

The benefits of these shelters extend beyond just providing a roof over one's head. Each unit is designed with essential amenities and built to withstand future natural disasters, ensuring that families are better prepared for any challenges ahead.
